New National Qualifications - Course Rationales and Summaries

[Course Rationale and Summary](#) draft documents for **National 4** and **National 5** are now available to view on the SQA website. The draft Course Rationales and Summaries outline the proposed content for the **new qualifications** and their aims and purposes.

The Course Rationales identify the skills and knowledge learners will develop.

The Course Summaries detail how Courses will be structured. They provide a brief description of each Unit in the Course and what is required to achieve the Course.

Course Rationales and Summaries are available for every subject at National 4 and National 5 level. [Literacy and Numeracy](#) are the responsibility of all education professionals. Literacy and Numeracy Units will be developed at SCQF levels 3, 4 and 5.

Newsflash about NAR! New curriculum area-focused assessment materials about to be uploaded to NAR for the first time



You'll remember that we have been working with 30+ schools since the start of the session to prepare some materials in each curriculum area across the 2nd, 3rd & 4th curriculum levels. Despite some schools losing time over December's snow, we had 29 sets of materials to take to the National Quality Assurance Group (NQAG) on Wednesday. A high proportion of these were awarded quality marks for key aspects and around 22 sets will make their way onto the [NAR](#) over the coming weeks. However, 7 schools had prepared materials to such a high

standard that little editing is required so we have been able to add them to NAR much sooner than expected. Another 6 sets may well be added shortly too.

It's really encouraging to see this improvement in the presentation of work we have received from schools – in terms of clarity, brevity, focus etc. This clearly shows a growing understanding of how to prepare accessible, useful resources for NAR in ways that will help other practitioners. Of course, our abilities at LTS to engage with EAs, schools and teachers in generating the evidence; preparing members of NQAG for their crucial role in quality assuring them; and our online & technical teams' skills in making everything look right before being uploaded to NAR have made this whole project a success.

On **Saturday 19 March 2011** at the **University of Abertay Dundee**, the Consolarium offers a lively CPD event for teachers as well as a celebration of the diverse and innovative practice in game based learning and game design that has been happening in schools across Scotland. Over the past few years the LTS Consolarium initiative has been working with partner schools across Scotland to help nurture the idea that commercially available computer games that have been developed for entertainment can be used to help create appealing, purposeful and challenging contexts for learning.

This conference will allow us to share the innovative and effective work of some of the many practitioners in Scotland who have embraced game based learning. The knowledge and experience that will be shared by our colleagues from schools will then be complemented in the afternoon by a range of differentiated hands-on activities aimed at developing delegates' own confidence and competence in this field. These activities include developing computer games design skills from the early stages through to S6, exploring treasure hunting via geocaching and a game based learning dance session.

The conference promises to deliver an exciting and inspiring CPD experience for those involved in education and Curriculum for Excellence. Delegates can choose from 16 morning seminars and 10 practical afternoon workshops, listen to inspiring opening and closing keynotes and spend time engaging with fellow educators and industry representatives including Sony, Nintendo and Microsoft.

A National Approach to Anti-Bullying for Scotland's Children and Young People

At the end of last year a [national approach](#) to anti-bullying was developed by the Scottish Government and the Scottish Anti-Bullying Steering Group to communicate and promote a common vision and aims; and to make sure that work across all agencies and communities is consistently and coherently contributing to a holistic approach to anti-bullying in Scotland.

ESOL Initial Assessment Pack

The ESOL Initial Assessment Guide is now available on the [ESOL Scotland website](#). The Guide was developed by Stevenson College and funded by the Scottish Government to support practitioners to undertake initial assessment with their learners. The Guide will help to standardise initial assessment procedures and place learners in the appropriate level of provision to ensure that all ESOL learners have the opportunity to make progress towards their specific language learning objectives and to achieve their personal, educational or employment goals.

The Guide can be used in a variety of contexts and settings to assess ESOL learners from ESOL Literacies beginners to entry to vocational courses and academic programmes of learning. It can be used by providers across all sectors including colleges, community, voluntary organisations and schools.

The Scottish Qualifications Authority (SQA) has developed a suite of **new Professional qualifications** to provide Professional development for practitioners working in the Teaching of English to Speakers of Other Languages (TESOL).
