PE EQUIPMENT



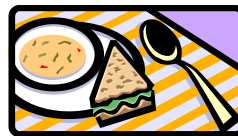
In accordance with Scottish Government guidance, all children in King's Meadow receive two hours of PE. In a school of this size, it is not always possible, or desirable, to hold this inside. As a result, there

may be occasions when your child will be taking part in PE outdoors when the weather may be cold, wet or windy. For outdoor activities pupils should wear a tracksuit or jogging bottoms and sweatshirt, extra socks and outdoor trainers. Rain jackets, hats and gloves should be worn when appropriate. It is important that pupils are ready to take part and also that they have a change of clothes and a bag to put wet gear in, so that they are comfortable for the rest of the day. We would appreciate your support with this.

Please ensure that your child has a full kit, including gym shoes/indoor trainers, shorts and a t-shirt (this should cover your child's midriff), with them at all times. Please note: In the interests of health and safety **no jewellery should be worn on gym days.**



LUNCHES



School lunches cost £1.90 per day. If you would like your child to have a school lunch you should make sure that they have the correct money with them every day. You will find copies of the menu on our website.



WATER



We would ask parents to ensure that children are sent to school each morning with a filled, named water bottle. This can be refilled, if required, during the day. **Please note** - only water should be

provided as sipping fruit juice, fresh or diluting, can lead to tooth decay.



UNIFORM

At King's Meadow we **strongly encourage** the wearing of our school uniform for a variety of reasons. Firstly, the wearing of school uniform helps to build up a sense of identity, pride and belonging within the school. It helps to distinguish between work and play i.e. "We wear our uniform to school where we go to learn." Secondly, it helps to cut down on individual differences between children and may help to reduce the sort of bullying brought about by children not wearing the current designer labels! **To date the majority of parents/carers have supported us in this.** We hope that this support will continue from year to year.

AROUND THE CLASSES



P4A have enjoyed settling into a new school routine and getting to know their new class and school. The class have learnt and discussed the King's Meadow Golden Rules and how they apply in our classroom. Our house points chart is on the wall and already the class have been earning points for excellent behaviour and

hard work, as well as for finding deliberate mistakes in their teacher's work!

Our class topic this term is the Olympics and Paralympics and we have already shared our existing knowledge and planned what we would like to learn. In mental maths, we are learning number bonds to 10 and 20 and, for those looking for a challenge, number bonds to 100. We have begun the term looking at the importance of a digit, its place and its value and we plan to continue developing our number knowledge this term. We will also have regular sessions where we apply our maths knowledge in

problem solving challenges. In Music, we are learning to sing and play simple songs on the ukulele.

We will be regularly completing the mile run, hopefully getting faster as the year progresses. We have already had some excellent efforts for our first run.

It's been a good start to the year - well done, 4A!



P4B have had a busy first week settling into our new school and class. We have been working hard to learn and follow the new routines both in class and in the playground.

The children have also been enjoying getting to know each other through a variety drawing, short writing activities and problem solving with a partner. As a class, we have looked at the King's Meadow Golden Rules and the children have been organised into the four houses. House points are given regularly as a reward for super behaviour and hard work.

In Numeracy, our focus will be digits and their value within a number. We will learn through playing games, using concrete materials, watching learning clips and completing written work. In mental arithmetic, we will consolidate our knowledge of number bonds to 10 and 20 and, if we feel a challenge is needed, we will move on to number bonds to 100.

Our first visit to the ICT room on Thursday was very much enjoyed. Linking with our Olympic topic, 4B have chosen to research an Olympic country, take notes and present the information on a simple Power Point.

This term we will be having music with our specialist Mrs Roberts. Initially, we will be doing some singing then learning to play simple tunes on the ukulele.



P4C have arrived healthy and happy after the summer break and I extend a warm welcome to all parents and carers.

Everyone is full of enthusiasm and raring to go, which is great as we have a full and exciting term planned! This term's studies are based on the topic of The Olympic and Paralympic Games. This exciting opportunity has fuelled the concept for our cross curricular learning:

Literacy - reading for information, report writing and Olympic vocabulary;

I.C.T - recording findings from search engines in note form to create information leaflets to share based upon a number of topics such as the Olympic Games, their history, the countries who take part and the sports undertaken;

Health and Wellbeing - The creed, or guiding principle, of the modern Olympic Games is a quote by Baron de Coubertin: "The most important thing in the Olympic Games is not to win but to take part, just as the most important thing in life is not the triumph but the struggle. The essential thing is not to have conquered but to have fought well." This gives great scope for further investigation into; The Olympic Motto, The Olympic Symbol, The Olympic Flame, The Athletes' Oath, The Olympic Movement and Olympic Awards. The class will also be encouraged to consider Olympic values; Friendship, Respect and Excellence - along with the four Paralympic values - Determination, Inspiration, Courage and Equality. The values underpin the Games as a set of universal principles, but they can be applied to education and our lives, as well as to sport itself.

In numeracy, our focus will be digits and their place value; we will play games, use materials and watch learning clips. We will discuss mental strategies and complete written work. All activities will focus on developing the understanding of the value of a digit depending on its place. Some of you may remember your studies of hundreds, tens and units - we hope to reach for thousands and beyond!

Please continue to discuss lunch options with your child before they come to school as this greatly increases their confidence when making independent choices.

I have been very impressed with the impeccable manners and diligent work ethic displayed by all members of our class. Well done, P4C!



P5A have settled in well and time seems to be speeding past already. The children have launched themselves into

their new topic, "The Unsinkable Ship", with enthusiasm. Our current mission is to re-create the Titanic on the classroom wall. We are working in groups and each group has a separate task to complete to achieve the end goal. We are also creating posters with key information about the

Titanic. As the weeks progress, we will receive new missions to help us learn more about the Titanic.

The class has adopted the concept of a "Growth Mindset" and have already completed an excellent piece of work about the "Learning Pit". Their posters illustrate the learning curve that they go through to achieve success and how they might feel at different times. Growth Mindset encourages resilience and perseverance to help learners - we are a try, try and try again classroom and know that mistakes actually help us to learn.

This year, in P5, we are starting to learn French. We have already covered some simple greetings - asking what your name is and how you are feeling. I'm looking for lots of "ca-va bien" and not many "ca-va pas bien".

The children have been sorted into their numeracy and maths groups based on an initial assessment. Please remember that the children can move around groups depending on the particular aspect of numeracy or maths that we are learning about.

The class now all have their first group reading book. I will work with a different reading group each day and set homework with them at that time. This means that reading homework will be due on different days for different children but this will be written into their diaries.

This term, PE is on a Tuesday and Wednesday with Mrs Arnold and, when possible, we will try to fit in our daily mile. We are also lucky to have the expertise of the Art Specialist, Mr Connell this term.



P5B think it's good to be back! Everyone has had the chance to catch up on holiday news and we are now ready to face the challenges of P5.

As you may know, P5 are working to recreate the 'Unsinkable Ship'. We have received a mission asking if we can research the ship and make a picture of it. It has been interesting to find out some of the facts that are not so well known - for example did you know that one funnel was just a dummy funnel? We are wondering if we will be given other missions and what we might be asked to do.... It would be best if everyone has a paint shirt as some of the tasks could be quite messy. An old adult sized t-shirt is ideal.

We have enjoyed practising and extending our computing skills and will be putting these to good use throughout the year.

PE, this session, is on a Monday afternoon and a Wednesday morning. If PE kit is not already in school, please send in some indoor and outdoor kit to be kept in school. Our focus just now is spatial awareness in invasion games and we are learning the skills through playing netball. We also have rugby sessions with Tom, our rugby development officer. There are three skills sessions on Thursday mornings and a festival at the end of September - dates will be written in the school diaries.

This term, we have an art block working with Mr Connell. Next term our focus will be music with Mrs Roberts.

We have already started learning French. At the moment we are practising greetings. We had fun letting our 'talking fingers' ask each other names and ages.



P5C have been settling in and getting back into school routines. It's been a pleasure getting to know the children and hearing about their holidays.

Our first topic is called "The Unsinkable Ship" and is all about The Titanic. The children are learning all about the ship, its construction, who sailed on her and ultimately what became of her!

In PE, Mrs Arnold and the class have been learning about invasion games and the focus will be Netball. They are learning about the importance of spatial awareness in games. Until October P5C will also have Mr Connell for Art.

Our focus in numeracy will be place value and whole number and in maths we will be learning about coordinates and grid references.

Homework for P5C will usually come home on Mondays to be completed by Thursdays. Thank you for helping your child to complete and return this.

A group reading novel should be coming home too - each group has a different novel and the children should have written their homework in their diary.

Lastly, a wee reminder about water bottles. It would much appreciated if you could make sure your child has one in school every day.



P6A have been working hard and settling in well. We have discussed the Golden Rules and the expectations now that we have entered the upper half of the school. This

week we heard speeches from six members of the class and then voted for our class rep. Well done to Adam, I'm sure he will make a fantastic class rep!

The first topic we will cover this year is Mock Court. We plan to find out about court systems and the way they work as well as different roles involved within proceedings. We will need to carefully prepare our case, evidence, witness statements and gowns so that we are ready to appear at a real Sheriff Court in Edinburgh in October. We intend to carry this theme across the curriculum and are looking forward to incorporating this into literacy, expressive arts and health and wellbeing.

In literacy, we will have a writing focus with a particular look at newspaper articles, in keeping with our Mock Court topic. We will learn about the features of a newspaper before creating our own. As a class we will also be studying a novel through which reading skills will be taught and developed.

So far in maths, we have been using various maths skills to help us solve our Maths Murder Mystery. We have all been working very hard and managed to reveal the murderer. Next, we plan to revise 2D shapes - their names and their properties. We will also cover symmetry.

Each day will include a mental maths slot in which we aim to develop speed and accuracy in mental agility.

In numeracy, our first topic will be place value.

This term we have music with Mrs Roberts, our specialist music teacher. We will also be learning in drama and this will tie into our Mock Court topic. We will get the chance to explore different roles and gain experience of rehearsing and performing. Some children will get the chance to present their work in a real court room!

This week in French we explored where France was and learned some facts about the country. We started to learn some basic greetings and had the chance to practise having a short conversation using our newly acquired vocabulary. I was incredibly pleased with the class and their first attempts at speaking French. Throughout the year we will continue to increase our knowledge of French.

P.E will be on a Tuesday and Thursday this term. Our focus this term will be Sport Education set within the context of Hockey. The children will be responsible for carrying out a number of different roles within a team including planning, coaching, time keeping, team captain.



P6B have many interesting experiences and activities to look forward to this year. During the first few days we focussed on getting to know each other and working well together. We

completed a class charter so that we know what to expect from each other. Please have a look if you are visiting us. Our first topic, this session, is a Mock Court case project. The children are looking forward to getting to learn more about the court system and will be preparing our case, evidence, witnesses and gowns so that we are ready to appear before a real Sheriff at Edinburgh Sheriff Court. Please get in touch if you are able to support us with this project. In numeracy, we will be splitting into groups based on the results from our pre-test and will focus on our whole number work. In maths, we plan to revise 2D shapes before investigating the symmetry of 2D shapes. We will apply this knowledge to symmetrical pictures and patterns. We have decided to focus on learning about the types of features we can use from different computer programs to help us create newspaper articles for our Mock Court project. This will be the focus of our writing lessons where we will investigate and learn about the features of newspaper articles. We will continue to take part in daily spelling lessons to learn our new spelling pattern or focus on our Rainbow Words. I look forward to seeing you throughout the school year. Please get in touch if you have any questions.

P6C have many interesting experiences and activities to look forward to this term.

We are going to be working on a class novel

study of Swallows and Amazons by Arthur Ransome. A film adaption of this children's classic has recently been released and it would be very



interesting to hear how the film compares to the children's experience of the book!

We have already started working on our Rainbow Words Challenge, which helps us to use and spell correctly the most frequently used words.

In PE, with Mrs Arnold, we have been introduced to a Sports Education approach to hockey. Each week we take on different roles within our team such as referee and coach. In class maths, we will be revising 2D shape before moving on to symmetry. Our focus in group numeracy will be place value and estimating and rounding.

Our first topic is the Mock Court Project. This is a fantastic opportunity for the class to take on a wide variety of real life roles and to work together to convince the Sheriff of their case. Have a look at www.mockcourt.org.uk for further information and examples of work from previous years.

P7A have settled back into school really well and are straight into lots of interesting activities.

This term, we will be developing our research skills and learning about primary and secondary sources. We will be studying life in WW2 and how it compares to life today and where events fit into the historical timeline. In addition, we will be looking at key events and significant people from this period and the impact they had on society. We hope that the children enjoy choosing and organising the WW2 homework activities that interest them. The activities and return dates have been given out already on an information sheet. The class will start art with Mr Connell this term and work will be related to their WW2 topic. 7A will be performing a class assembly in September to show case their topic work and parents, guardians and friends will be invited to attend.

In PE, we are practising skills and improving fitness and will be focusing on playing hockey. We are still participating in the Daily Mile Challenge and the class have had an opportunity to experience a Judo taster - look out Tokyo 2020! Talking of the Olympics, we have been discussing what makes a great athlete and who has been inspirational to the children during the Rio Olympics.

Each class member will get two opportunities to become a prefect and help around the school. They have already made their requests and Mr Smith will officially introduce them to the whole school at an assembly and they will be given a prefect badge. It is a super opportunity for them.



P7B have quickly settled back in to school life and seem ready for the year ahead. We have been working hard, have established some class rules and have produced some super results so far. The summer holidays seem like a

distant memory already!

In our first week, we worked in groups during an "Apprentice" style challenge where we had to design a new product to help children with daily school life. Mrs McGinlay was very impressed with our ideas, work ethic and the finished designs that we presented to the class. Lord Alan Sugar would have a hard time deciding on the winning product!! Well done everyone☺

Our first group of children have been given their roles as prefects and have made an impressive start to their responsibilities within the school. Congratulations to the elected House Captains and to our class School Parliament representative. We are sure they will all do a great job☺

As a class, we have decided to use World War 2 as the context for our interdisciplinary learning. We will be focussing on being able to identify similarities and differences in home life during WW2 and present day. In ICT, we have begun researching information about the important leaders during the War. Our writing will be inspired by WW2 events and our music and art this term will also be WW2 related. We will also be looking at Judaism to tie in RME.

In class Maths, we are looking at 2D shape. We will be using mathematical language to describe the properties of 2D shapes and investigating where and why particular shapes are used in the environment. We will also be learning how to use a pair of compasses to draw a circle. In group Maths, we have are starting by looking at place value. In Numeracy, we have started our groups and are focussing this term on place value and rounding.

In P.E. we are focussing on gross and fine motor skills, speed, communication and decision making in hockey. We are working towards a P7 tournament in October. PE days are Monday and Tuesday - please

ensure a change of clothing is in school for these lessons.



P7C have had a fantastic start to P7. The children have settled back in so quickly to the daily routines of school and have been working hard independently, as well as cooperatively with

their peers. We had a lovely time helping at the Infant School sports day and 7C set a great example to the younger children and were extremely helpful to the teachers as well. Well done to you all!

On the first week of term the children took part in the Apprentice Challenge where they were expected to invent a product for children of the future that would make school life a little easier. The class had some super ideas and gave some very convincing pitches but in the end it was the "Magic Multi-Monkey Chair" that won the class vote. Well done to the winning team!

We have started work on our first P7 topic, World War II. The children have shared their knowledge of the war so far and have identified what they want to learn about over the next few weeks. The topic will have a literacy focus with the children writing imaginative pieces as well as reading for information, making notes and presenting their findings. Our class novel will be "The Boy in the Striped Pyjamas" and the children will be doing some reading work based around this novel. You should also have received a list of World War II related class homework tasks. The children should pick three tasks from the list and hand them in on the date specified.

This week we began lessons in Maths and Numeracy. The children will have maths lessons in class and numeracy will be taught in groups across the year. For the next few weeks our maths topic will be shape and our numeracy work will focus on place value, estimation and rounding.

7C will be working with all of our school specialists at some point throughout the year. This term we will be working with Mr Connell, the art specialist, and Mrs Arnold, the P.E. specialist. Mrs Arnold's P.E. lessons are on a Tuesday and Thursday but the class also have a short lesson with me on a Wednesday. They should have P.E. kit in school every day and it should be suitable for all weathers.

Thank you again to all of the children in 7C for settling back into school very quickly and approaching all of their work with a positive attitude and a lot of enthusiasm. Well done and I hope that it continues throughout the year.



P7D are already feeling very settled into Primary 7. We spent the first couple of days getting to know each other and discussed behaviour. Together we have completed a class charter so that we know how to treat each other in class and around the school.

We put this charter to good use last week when we worked together in groups on an 'apprentice' challenge where we had to create and design a new product to make children's lives easier in school. The children did a fabulous job of presenting their product to the class. Miss Winter was most impressed.

We have elected house captains and the first group of children has been giving their prefect duties. Everyone will have the opportunity to take on a prefect role, if you haven't been chosen this term you will have the chance next term.

Our topic has got off to a flying start and we have already started to learn why WW2 started. In ICT, we will research some of the important leaders during this time. As this topic has a literacy focus, we will be using different styles of writing. Our class novel this term will be "The Boy in the Striped Pyjamas" by John Boyne.

The children will be taking part daily in mental maths activities. In maths, children will be working on shape and in numeracy the children will be split into groups across the year stage and focussing on place value, estimating and rounding.
